


The event that defined the night at the NNU night at the Steelheads hockey game was Jayson






The Woman Is Required to Pay



Community Service



SGA has a position for the coordinator of the corporate service projects to provide students with organized and traditional volun-



compassionate and caring.





Towers of Terror

The day of September 11 will forever be a part of our lives. People around the world watched in horror as American Airlines Flight 11 and United Airlines Flight 175 flew into the World Trade Center Twin Towers in New York City. One hour later American



Airlines Flight 77 crashed into the Pentagon. This is the first time in history that the United States has been attacked by terrorists on its own land. American lives changed on this Tuesday morning. President George W. Bush declared war on terrorists. He vowed to bring the attackers to justice. America went to fighting a war that had never been fought before, the War on Terrorism and its first target, Osama bin Laden. Troops were deployed to Afghanistan to fight the Taliban and the al Qaeda

network. On campus a feeling of disbelief and awe hung in the air. Ed Media placed televisions in all the buildings on campus that did not have one. I know people who both live and work in Washington D.C. and New York City. I just sat and cried." With the Anti-Terror bill passed and a huge overhaul in airport security, a long war looms ahead for the United States. Our country has chnaged in countless ways because of it. Our newfound patriotism that swept across the nation has proven to be a catalyst for unity. Simply put, we are one, but not the same.







King of the School








> After the ceremony there were many beaming faces and congratulations. Another stage of life has been completed and now comes the step of moving into a large world, but at least







All in all the 2001-2002 freshman might have only left a dent this past year, but they hope to make a long lasting impression in the years to come.








Men's and Women's Cross Country







Beginning with a blistering record of 10-3, the mighty women Crusaders opened their season with rewarding victories over eight non-league opponents. The Crusaders soon endured a fivegame losing steak in conference play. The women's team ended their season with an 11-8 record and a well-earned ticket to NCCAA Nationals in Kissimmee, Florida after defeating Western Baptist College in two exciting overtime wins. At Nationals, the team was seeded fifth, but moved their way up to a 3rd place finish after defeating Spring Arbor 3-0, then trailing behind Gardner Webb university 2-1 (3ot) and concluding their season with a win against Olivet Nazarene University.

The girls did well their previous year, but markedly better in 2001. The 'Saders only graduated thress seniors last year and only added two new names to the roster, making the team close to the same as it was in 2000. The result of their newfound unity was the best record the program has ever had.






Men's Basketball


The Crusaders will deeply miss their seniors who were not only talented, but hardworking. The seniors emphasized the trams motto, which was to practice hard so they would play hard.






Baseball


A Catch to Win






Golf










One and Not the Same








